IN MEMORIAM

Ted King of Bellingham, a Pearl Harbor survivor who often talked to students about World War II, died Monday, Jan. 26. He was 86.

A service with military honors will be held at 11 a.m. Thursday at Westford Funeral Home. A reception will follow at Westford's Broadway Hall.

King was a cook aboard the USS Nevada, one of the battleships in Hawaii that bore the brunt of the Japanese attack on Dec. 7, 1941. Fifty of her crewmen and officers died.

Born in Bellingham, King grew up in Maple Falls and enlisted in the Navy after graduating from Lynden High School. After 20 years in the service, he worked for the state employment services office as an advocate for veterans.

When King talked to classes, he often brought tiny American flags to give students, plus an essay about why Americans should respect the flag.

WB Ted King elected to membership in Whatcom Lodge on 1/18/1945, just over 64 years ago. Ted was initiated 12/27/1946, passed 1/23/1947 and raised 2/24/1947. Ted King served as Worshipful Master in 1972. WB Ted was the longest serving Whatcom Lodge Secretary here-to-fore, serving from 1985 through 1997.

In 1997, in recognition of WB Ted's enthusiasm and dedication to Whatcom Lodge WB Glenn Hutchings established The Ted King Inspirational Award to honor brothers who display a similar devotional service to the lodge. WB Ted King will be sorely missed but long remembered.

RECOGNIZING A STROKE

Thank God for the sense to remember the '3' steps, STR.

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke.

Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

S *Ask the individual to SMILE.

T *Ask the person to TALK and SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE (Coherently) (i.e. It is sunny out today)

R *Ask him or her to RAISE BOTH ARMS.

If he or she has trouble with ANY ONE of these tasks, call emergency number <u>immediately</u> and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

New Sign of a Stroke ------ Stick out Your Tongue

NOTE: Another 'sign' of a stroke is this: Ask the person to 'stick' out his tongue.. If the tongue is 'crooked', if it goes to one side or the other, that is also an indication of a stroke.

A cardiologist says if everyone who gets this e-mail sends it to 10 people; you can bet that at least one life will be saved.

Stewart Van Wingerden, age 87 of Bellingham passed away Wednesday, October 15, 2008. During WWII Stewart served in the Army Air Corps. While stationed in Honolulu, he worked on the Stars and Stripes newspaper. Bro. Stewart was a career educator. He taught 6th grade at Birchwood Elementary School, he also taught at the Campus School at Western WA. University, where he finished his teaching career as a Professor in the School of Education, a position he held for 32 years, retiring in 1984

Stewart was elected to membership in Whatcom Lodge on 5/15/1950. He was Initiated on 6/1/1950, Passed on 2/14/1952 and Raised on 4/3/1952.

Ernest W. Francisco, age 92, passed away on Tuesday, December 9th, 2008. Though born in Sedro Woolley, WA the family moved to Bellingham where he graduated from High School. After graduation he started a career in retail joining the J.J. Newberry Co. Over the years he rose in positions of responsibility, Manager, District Manager to Director of Sales. Ernie worked in various States, Washington, Idaho and California. He retired in El Paso, Texas in 1978.

Ernie was an avid sportsman, enjoying hunting and fishing. Big game was his passion, making eight trips to Africa. He also loved to work with his hands, tooling leather and working in ceramic tiles.

Ernie was elected to membership in Whatcom Lodge on 6/16/1938. He Was Initiated on 9/1/1938, Passed on 9/22/1938 and Raised on 10/6/1938
