CHILD IDENTIFICATION PROGRAM (CHIP)

The Child Identification Program (CHIP) is a volunteer effort to provide identification to families so that they have needed records and information on their children in the event a child becomes lost, missing or kidnapped. The program includes a video, fingerprints, a tooth impression and a DNA swab.

This worthwhile program has been undertaken by the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of F. & A.M. of Washington. A 501(c)(3) Nonprofit corporation has been established.

Lynden Lodge, in close cooperation with the Whatcom County Sheriff's Office and the Lynden Police Department, will be operating a booth at the Northwest Washington Fair during the week of August 11 - 16.

Last year, at the Evergreen State Fair in Monroe, Masons and other volunteers processed 1900 children during the 12 days of that Fair. They have successfully operated this program for several years and it continues to grow.

WB Howard Ballou, who many of you heard give an overview of CHIP at the Lynden Lodge *Hands Across the Border* dinner in March, is the Grand Lodge committeeman in charge of this program and will be with us during the entire week of the Northwest Washington Fair. At his suggestion we have set a target to process 400 children during this first year of the program.

While there is no cost to the children or their parents for participation in this program, there is a cost of \$5.00 for each child for various supplies, equipment and administration. Lynden Lodge has provided \$500 which will cover 100 children. Ferndale Lodge #264 has generously contributed \$250 to this program. All the other Lodges in District 10 have been requested to support this program. I know that other Lodges are considering to provide their support as well. All sponsors will be recognized on a sign at the booth at the Fair as well as in the media.

When the request to support this program is brought up in your Lodge, please endorse it. Thanks in advance for your help!

LYNDEN LODGE BIKES 4 BOOKS

Lynden Lodge delivered two new bikes to 10 Mile Creek Elementary School in the Meridian School District and two new bikes to Lynden Middle School in the Lynden School District. These bikes were delivered in February with the understanding that the schools would establish a reading program for their students. Each time a student completed a reading unit with report, their name was entered into a drawing. There was to be a drawing for boys and one for girls. Both schools have reported that the bikes have generated much interest in reading among the students and the teachers are also enthusiastic about the program. Both schools will hold their drawings in early June at an assembly and Lynden Lodge members will be present when the bikes are awarded.

The bikes were listed at \$80.00 each, but Bellingham Target gave us a discount on the price which was appreciated. Each bike winner will also receive a \$20.00 gift card from Target to cover the cost of a new bike helmet. This was the first time Lynden Lodge has tried the Bikes 4 Books program, but based on the results to date, there will be more programs in Lynden's future.

MLA Report On Saturday, April 19th, the Masonic Leadership Association held its meeting at San Juan Lodge #175 in Friday Harbor. WB Ed Ashcraft and the San Juan brothers were excellent hosts (they always are). They put on a great feed for lunch after which the visiting brethren caught the 1:30 ferry back to Anacortes. We thank them for their hospitality!

Bro. Jerry Mason presented an overview of the Child Identification Program (CHIP). Lynden Lodge #56, in conjunction with the Whatcom County Sheriff's Office and the Lynden Police Department, will process an estimated 400 children at the Northwest Washington Fair in Lynden in August. CHIP is endorsed by the Grand Lodge of Washington and has been very successful throughout the state.

The topics discussed at this meeting were:

Masonic Education Council. The MEC is well on the way to obtaining tax-exempt status. An EIN has been obtained and an application for 501(c)(3) status is being prepared. According to the filing instructions, the MEC will be able to function as a tax-exempt organization while approval of the application is pending.

Declining membership. One of the tools that can be used to develop interest in Masonry is advertising. Mount Zion Lodge #120 in Chilliwack recently placed two advertisements in their local newspaper which resulted in 9 petitions for the degrees and 4 petitions for affiliation. These ads were approved by the Grand Lodge of British Columbia & Yukon. These Canadian ad slicks were obtained and sent to our Grand Secretary who presented them to Grand Master Wayne I. Smith for approval. He has given his approval in principal but requested that the ads be resubmitted in a U.S. format. Resubmission has been made and the Grand Master's approval should be forthcoming soon. The unapproved ad slicks were distributed at the meeting so that everyone could see the content and format.

Bro. George Washington's portrait in our public schools. Many of us remember when Bro. Washington's portrait hung in every classroom. This program is sanctioned by Grand Lodge. Lodges in District 10 as a group are purchasing portraits in order to get a significantly reduced price. The portraits will hang in the foyer or some other well-traveled area of each school. If your Lodge has not yet made the decision to participate in this worthwhile program, please do so soon as the order will be placed with the George Washington Memorial group sometime in May.

Proficiency in Lodge Management. The requirement for each incoming Worshipful Master to be proficient before he will be installed will be on the ballot at Grand Lodge in June. This motion was defeated last year. Grand Lodge is attempting to maintain a consistent standard for proficiency by the Master. Many Lodges are utilizing this program to enhance their proficiency regardless of whether or not this motion passes in Grand Lodge. This program is available on the Grand Lodge web site.

Other topics discussed at the meeting included: the seminar for the District 10 calendar on April 26th and the comparison of actual revenues and expenses to the MLA budget for the first quarter of 2008.

Announcements were made regarding upcoming events. In particular, see the front page Ad for the Annual Outdoor Fellow-craft Degree on Saturday, May 17th, 2008

Once again the meeting lasted just an hour and thirty minutes. Brothers, this is how Masons work!!!
