Whatcom Lodge Report

Stated Meeting - Our stated meeting was held on October 21st with eighteen brothers attending. In addition to the regular business of the lodge, we had some petitions to Read, some presentations to make and a couple of interesting programs to enlighten and entertain.

Programs: A DVD lecture was viewed, from a course titled: American Ideals *Founding a Republic of Virtue*, by Prof. Daniel Robinson. The 30 minute lecture was on the Declaration of Independence. Following the lecture Bro's Terrell Goertz & Monte Thompson spoke about their recent trips: Bro. Goertz visited Universal Fraternity Lodge ♯149 in Stratford, Connecticut and Bro. Monte visited Ireland, England and Belgium.

Presentations: Brother Scott Voss, who is our newest life member, was presented with his Life Membership Certificate. Brothers Craig Bruner and Joel Laufenberg were presented their lodge Id badges and a few brothers received their overdue lambskin apron inserts verifying that they had been initiated, passed and raised.

The first section was performed by a law enforcement degree team, the majority of which were in uniform. Island Spice . . . in Connecticut

This October, Brother Pat Churchill of Damascus Lodge #199 and myself took a trip to Hartford, Connecticut. We were sent by our company to take classes on insurance, annuities and mutual funds from The Hartford. We however, had additional motives for going. After dutifully attending the necessary classes, we stayed another couple of days to turn this into our own "Masonic trip" of discovery. First, we went to the home of one of Hartford's most famous residence, Samuel Clemens better known to us as author and Brother Mark Twain. We arrived too late for the final tour of the day, but managed to slide in with an after hours special "Ghost Tour" of the Twain Mansion. Bro. Churchill and myself were the only skeptics in the group. When we reached the top floor and arrived in Bro. Twain's "man cave", we observed his pool table and beautiful ventilation system which effectively dealt with the smoke from the almost TWENTY cigars Twain smoked on a daily basis. No women where ever allowed in this room. The tour guide breathlessly proclaimed that supernatural forces were at work that very night as "...for the first time in my career, I can actually smell cigar smoke in this room!" Pat and myself resisted the urge to bust out laughing like schoolchildren as we had just minutes before finished off a couple of robust cigars ourselves and no doubt contributed to the aura of the supernatural.

The next day, we drove to Rhode Island. The famous Fall Colors of the New England states were on display in their full majesty while we made our way to Newport, Rhode Island. Also in attendance that night was a Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of the State of Connecticut, who filled us in a little history of the Lodge. These Brothers applied for a Charter for Dispensation in 2006 from the state. This PGM was the Grand Master at the time. He told the Brothers he would grant the Charter in one year . . . IF they would learn to deliver all parts of all three degrees in English! You see, all these fine Brothers had been conducting all their work in their native tongue of FRENCH!

With incredible work, effort, dedication, and love for the Craft every Brother in this Lodge learned to become proficient in delivering the Degrees in fine form in their second language in just one year. They received their Charter for Dispensation and now proudly work under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Connecticut. Bro. Churchill and I had the privilege of watching them put on a dual Fellow Craft Degree in outstanding form. A fine job was done from the Tyler to the Worshipful Master and everyone in between. We even got to hear them sing . . . in French.

These Brothers should be an inspiration to us all. Every Mason should consider his ability to contribute in Lodge, Chapter, Council or whatever Masonic body he's a member of. Even a 3-5 line part done from memory will contribute enormously to all our enjoyment and fraternally bonding. After all, I bet NOBODY will ever order you to deliver the Middle Chamber Lecture in French!
